# **Central Office Prepares to Move**

New Office Hours go in effect October 1, 2001; Office relocation is scheduled for November

The Intercounty Fellowship Board's New Lease Committee reports that architectural work on the new Central Office facility is proceeding, and a move-in date sometime in November is anticipated.

The photograph above is taken from Sacramento Street, just west of Van Ness Avenue. The new office is a storefront location, with high ceilings, glass walls, and two large windows looking out to the street, creating a spacious and open atmosphere. Several free parking spaces, along the west side of the building, are included in our 10 year lease - which is only \$20 per month more than our existing office at Van Ness and

# More on the Lord's Prayer

The Central Office has received several letters in response to Steve C.'s letter on the Lord's Prayer (July 2001). We will continue to print these, as space allows.

As with any use of human language, perspective makes a big difference in how it is understood. Though the "Our Father" comes from the Christian religious tradition, it can be used in an "inclusive" manner, namely, the group using it intends to include every one and everything in its purview, whether or not they are "Christian". The Lord's Prayer can also be used in an "exclusive" way to exclude those people who are not considered part of the group using the prayer. Even among Christian denominations and sects, some groups use it to exclude other types of Christians as well as believers in God from other religious traditions or atheists.

Clearly the perspective of Alcoholics Anonymous in using

the Lord's Prayer is inclusive. Even though it is evident to many who study the history of Christian theology that many of the principles and values which are used in the Big Book come from Christianity, they also recognize that its invitation to the alcoholic to rely on a higher power and to believe in that power is not an invitation to get baptized and become Christian. The truly revolutionary theological concept be hind the Big Book is to ask all to believe in a higher power which is inclusive whatever religious tradition or lack of one from which they come. This basic theological concept is the foundation of AA faith. And if in the AA tradition the "Our Father" has been adopted as one of its prayers, it is done so with the understanding that it be inclusive when it is used.

I use the Lord's Prayer in an inclusive manner whether at an AA meeting or when I am worshipping in a Christian church. I realize it is incumbent on me to help others understand the inclusive nature of believing in a higher power. One of the most simple ways to do this is that when praying the "Our Father" I always say "hallowed by thy names" as a way of recognizing the many ways the higher power is addressed. From AA I have learned to believe that even though there is a plurality of ways of connecting with a higher power, the higher power is inclusive and accepts everyone and everything as they are. Out of diversity there can come a unity as in the United States: "E pluribus unum".

The Christian church where I worship has made a concerted attempt to be inclusive in its use of language in the Bible and prayer by using non-gender specific words in its prayers or hymns to show an inclusive use of our understanding of God. So now we pray "Our Creator" and address God as "Creator", not "Father", to avoid sexist use of language. My hope is that eventually AA will use inclusive language in new editions of the Big Book and official literature.

# TRADITION TEN No Opinion on Outside Issues

Tradition Ten." [Short Form]: "Alcoholics Anonymous has no opinion on <u>outside issues</u>; hence the A.A. name ought never be drawn into <u>public</u> controversy

Tradition Ten (Long Form): "No A.A. group or member should ever, in such a way as to implicate A.A., express any opinion on outside controversial issues — particularly those of politics, alcohol reform, or sectarian religion. The Alcoholics Anonymous groups oppose no one. Concerning such matters they can express no views whatever."

We are warned not to take sides in any fight. Should A.A., as a whole, enter public controversy our Society would perish. We have seen that the moment we lent the A.A. name to any outside enterprise we got into trouble.

The protection of the A.A. name is of such importance to us that we once thought of incorporating it everywhere throughout the world, thereby availing ourselves of legal means to stop any misuse. We even thought of asking Congress to grant us the unusual favor of a Congressional incorporation. We felt that the existence of these legal remedies might prove to be a great deterrent.

After several years of deliberation we decided against such a course. Those early members believed that the power to sue would be a dangerous thing for us to possess. It was recognized that a public lawsuit is a public controversy, something in which our Tradition says we may not engage. To make our legal position secure, it would have been

necessary to incorporate our whole Fellowship, <u>and no one</u> wished to see our spiritual way of life incorporated. It seemed certain that we could confidently trust A.A. opinion, public opinion, and God Himself to take care of Alcoholics Anonymous in this respect.

If A.A. were to be attacked at the public level, we decided that the best possible attitude in such a circumstance would be that of almost complete nonresistance – certainly no anger and certainly no attack. We have no doctrine that has to be maintained, we have no membership that has to be enlarged. We have no authority that has to be supported. We have no prestige, power, or pride that has to be satisfied. And we have no property or money that is really worth quarreling about

Alcoholics Anonymous will give away (and has given to the other 12<sup>th</sup>-Step fellowships) all its knowledge and experience, except the A.A. name. The public use of the A.A. name should be avoided by those using A.A. techniques and ideas. Should the A.A. name be misapplied, it would be a Conference duty to ask for discontinuance, always, however, short of public controversy.

The Washingtonian Society (a movement among alcoholics which started in Baltimore a century before A.A), almost discovered the answer to alcoholism. At first the society was composed entirely of alcoholics, trying to help one another. They had a membership passed the one-hundred -thousand mark, but they lost sight of their primary purpose and within a few years they were gone. The alcoholic went "back into the cave" for the next 100 years, until Bill met Bob and Alcoholics Anonymous, as a society, was formed.



#### **Marin Teleservice Launches New Website!**

In June 2001, Marin Teleservice unveiled it's new website, www.marinteleservice.com. The website was created in an effort to increase participation and make it easier for people to volunteer to answer the telephones for Alcoholics Anonymous. It offers an interactive screen where you can enter your contact information and indicate the days and times you are available to answer the phone. The information is automatically sent to the webmaster and the chairperson of Marin Teleservice. New volunteers receive a reply thanking them for their interest, and their contact information is forwarded to the five weekly coordinators so shifts can be filled. Volunteers also can obtain sign-up sheets from the Teleservice representatives at meetings.

Some of you may be wondering . . . what is Teleservice? If you look in the Marin County phone book for Alcoholics Anonymous, the telephone number you call, 499-0400, is answered by Teleservice volunteers. People calling this number can get information on times and locations of meetings, or find someone to talk to if they have questions about stopping drinking. During the day, the phones are answered by volunteers at Central Office in San Francisco. After 6 p.m., the phones are answered by volunteers working from their homes in Marin County. Each month, there are approximately 150 shifts that must be covered. This includes both the on-line shifts (people directly responsible for answering the phones) and back-up shifts (people who support the on-line person or answer the phones when the on-line person is unavailable). Teleservice volunteers are further supported by 12-Step Volunteers who make themselves available to take people to meetings or talk more in depth with the still suffering alcoholics.

Just about anywhere you go in the world, you can pick up the phone and call someone in Alcoholics Anonymous. This is made possible by the many volunteers who so freely give of their time to help carry the message. Marin Teleservice is ALWAYS looking for volunteers. One of the greatest things about this commitment is that you can do it from your home. With the invention of cell phones, many of our volunteers take their commitments with them. Marin Teleservice provides each volunteer with Teleservice Guidelines that includes information for on-line and back-up shifts. We also have coordinators available to answer any questions.

If you would like to become involved in Marin Teleservice, we welcome your participation! We meet at 7:30 p.m. on the 4th Tuesday of each month at the Alano Club, 1360 Lincoln Street, in San Rafael. Or just log onto www.marinteleservice.com with any questions, and one of us will call you back.

As it says on page 164 of the Big Book,"... give freely of what you find and join us...." We at Marin Teleservice look forward to hearing from you and more importantly to continuing to serve the needs of alcoholics coming to Marin County.


will be holding its regular monthly meeting in November in Marin County. This will be the third IFB meeting held in Marin this year. The location will be the same as the July meeting:

- A. **REVIEW OF AGENDA:** The agenda was approved.
- B. REVIEW OF MINUTES: The minutes of the July, 2001 regular meeting were accepted without changes.
- C. IFB REPORTS

Chair's Report: Bob Bills is newly elected chair.

**Central Office Manager's Report:** This is Abigail Howard's last report as outgoing Central Office Manager. She allowed that she may think of some of us from time to time. With gratitude to the many volunteers—There are still some volunteer shifts open, and interested persons are asked to contact Central Office. First printings of the new 4<sup>th</sup> Edition Big Book are expected in this fall—If you plan to place orders for 1<sup>st</sup> printings, please let the office know so they may try to plan their order. Volunteers were also requested to staff the C.O. table at Spirit of San Francisco Conference.

Treasurer's Report: Pat Marasco, Treasurer, was unable to attend.

D. Central Office Committee: Patrick Connors reporting--The Central Office Committee reported on their extensive discussion regarding hiring a new Central Office Manager. It was recommended that the process of receiving and reviewing applicants be reopened and that the Mark Miller, currently full-time special worker, be hired as interim manager. This motion was made and approved by the IFB 26 to zero, with 1 abstention. (Two applicants had come forward and participated in the interview process, while the established guideline is for ranking the top five candidates and presenting them to the IFB for consideration.) It was also reported that the minutes of the COC will now be approved by the COC at each consecutive COC meeting, thus providing the

COC a fair opportunity to review and approve them before *formal* submission to the IFB. Finally, it was announced that the COC would help host a going-away and thank-you party for Abby to take place later in August.

- E. Lease Committee: Ardis Jerome reporting-- A motion was made and approved by the IFB 27 to zero, with no abstentions, to authorize the potential transfer of up to \$24, 637 from the Central Office prudent reserve to operating funds in order to cover possible short-term cash flow problems in the operating accounts related to taking possession of the new property and making agreed improvements (all previously discussed and specifically approved). The amount (\$24, 637) is the figure that the new landlord has pledged in tenant improvements--but these will be reimbursed after we have incurred the expense (hence the possible short-term cash flow shortage). Ardis submitted a detailed written update on the upcoming move and the on-going lease negotiations and anticipated signing, including financial projections.
- **F.** In a special order of business, **Standing IFB committees** were briefly described and new volunteers were recruited from the IFB. There was general consideration and discussion regarding participation by non-IFB members on IFB committees and it was agreed without dissention that it was to be the accepted practice for non-IFB advisory members to participate in committees of the IFB.
- G. Special Needs Committee: David DeNeef reporting-- The Board voted without 25 to zero with 2 abstentions to adopt guide-lines for consideration of reimbursement of signer costs to groups as submitted by the Special Needs Committee. These include specific guidelines for yearly review and renewal of all arrangements for part-payment of professional ASL signing at individual groups by the intergroup. IFB members were also requested to consult their groups and consider the possibility of the IFB authorizing payment of ASL translation (to translate spoken English into ASL and ASL into spoken English) fees for a deaf member of the Seeing and Hearing the Big Book Meeting to become a participating IFB representative.
- H. Brief informal reports were made for PI/CPC, H&I, and Teleservice in the absence of regular liaisons.
- I. Marin General Service—Ken Conroy reporting. Announcements of upcoming August events were made. A detailed printed update was submitted, including the information that Marin General Service has voted to form an ad hoc committee to "explore the Marin fellowship's needs....traditionally provided by....Central Office, and possible alternatives." Marin Teleservice has a website: www.marinteleservice.com

The meeting was closed with the Serenity Prayer following a 7<sup>th</sup> Tradition collection of \$48.00.

In the past, the office has benefited from the service of many 'walk-in' volunteers, who perform such tasks as helping with newsletter and meeting schedule production. But recent changes in office operation, and well as the physical layout of the new Central Office on Sacramento Street will necessitate that these activities be more tightly scheduled. # September 2001 IFB Meeting

The following is an unofficial summary of actions, information, upcoming business, and service opportunities discussed at the September 2001 IFB meeting. It is provided for your convenience and is not intended to be the complete or approved minutes.

#### **BUSINESS / DISCUSSION**

- Bob B., Chair, reviewed the general procedure for placing items for discussion on the agenda, which is to contact Bob B. or Mark M (Central Office Manager), or preferably both, at least several days before the upcoming IFB meeting and make the request.
- The fact that the cost of the new 4th Edition of the Big Book to Central Office will be discounted by \$1 (for a limited time) generated extensive and lengthy discussion of the policies and procedures for book sales in our Central Office. We have traditionally tried to resell books to local groups at near cost (unlike some other Intergroups, which derive substantial profit from book sales), and the focus of discussion was whether or not to pass this temporary \$1 savings per book along to the groups (by temporarily discounting the cost of the new 4th Edition). It was ultimately decided by majority vote to continue to sell Big Books at the current cost


