Before I got sober, love's passions and heartaches had already been a difficult struggle in my life. Bill W. talks about addiction as a physical allergy and a mental obsession. I believe this is true and have seen the mental obsession at work in my mind with alcohol and drugs but also with food, emotions, sex and love.

I listened carefully when I heard it suggested that a single person not date for the first year of sobriety. I was open to the suggestion because my way of relating was not working well.

I lost the desire to have a healthy relationship during the last few years of my drinking and using. I did not want any interference with my drinking. When I got sober, I had not been dating for two years. I was okay waiting another year.

Much came to me in my first year of sobriety. Difficulties in feeling emotions and seeing what was real were slowly being peeled away to reveal life on life's terms. This was such a strange concept because I previously spent so much time hiding and not coping by using alcohol and drugs.

After a while, I was okay having a true feeling and accepting it rather than trying to control it, change it or conquer it with alcohol. I started to feel that I was ready to start dating. I was also very lonely.

I first attempted my dating search as if I were applying for a job. I networked with friends, signed up for speed dating and wrote an Internet ad. After a year of this, I was getting upset with my Higher Power (HP) because things were not happening at the speed I wanted. I thought I was due the right person, right away. "Hey, HP," I found myself thinking, "I am ready now for my life partner...Where is she?"

Then I met someone I really liked and worked up the nerve to ask her out. Dating seemed foreign and awkward. I had not dated sober for a very long time. I was scared to kiss or have sex. I couldn't remember the last time I had sex that I wasn't drunk, stoned or drugged. She finally made a physical advance toward me and I was relieved.

We went out for three weeks and I started telling all my friends I met my life partner. Then I went away for a weekend without her. When I came back, she told me she got together with someone she always liked. I was very hurt and allowed myself to feel the sadness and the pain. I had some tools and called my best friend, my sponsor, and tried to speak at meetings. I found I didn't

Slogan of the Month We'll Love You Until You Can Love Yourself

When I came into A.A., I was baffled at my sponsor's willingness to spend time with me doing step work. I was unable to comprehend the love, tolerance, patience and support the fellowship gave to me at meetings. Now I recognize the love they expressed by reaching out to me, a fellow suffering alcoholic. For seven months I resisted their love and support. Then I drank again.

For the next six months, my life degenerated. I came to the realization that I was truly powerless over alcohol. I stopped communicating with friends and family. I stopped smiling and laughing. I could no longer look at myself in the mirror. I hated myself round the clock, knowing each time I picked up a drink I was choosing hell instead of reaching for the piece of heaven A.A. offered me.

A.A. members called to ask how I was doing. Usually I was too drunk and too terrified to return their calls. But their love and concern were music to my ears. One member left a message saying that no matter what shape I was in, he wanted to buy me coffee and see that I was okay. I saved this message and replayed it often.


Eventually I had my moment of Grace. I lost my craving for alcohol. I surrendered and returned to A.A., terrified of

being rejected. I was welcomed with open arms. The women hugged me, though I hadn't showered for days. People had prayed for me, hoping I would make it back safely. My sponsor started me on the steps right away. She listened to me, taking upwards of ten calls from me per day. I began to feel a love beyond my comprehension.

I have two years and nine months sober today. I now see that my Higher Power was loving me all along through the A.A. members who reached out to me while I was both "in" and "out." Many of them are among my closest friends today. A few are no longer sober. I think about them often. I call them periodically, pray for them daily and hope for their safe return as was done for me.

Daily I work the steps and practice the spiritual principles of the program. I have slowly learned how to love myself through these daily actions and have gained a self-esteem that keeps me afloat on down days. I know the privilege and honor of working the steps with newcomers, of loving them until they are able to love themselves. The more suffering alcoholics I reach out to, the more channels I open for my Higher Power to love me. This is how I stay sober. I have found a Higher Power through the fellowship and steps of Alcoholics Anonymous that fills me with enough love to give away.

Valentine's Day Massacres

I have been dumped around Valentine's Day three times in my short life. I was active in my addiction and the breakups gave me license to go on huge binges.

I recall the drinking binge I indulged in after the first Valentine's Day massacre. I was a college sophomore and was truly in love. I thought he was "the one" and was envisioning our wedding. Then he dumped me. It was

Valentine's Day and our one-year anniversary to boot. I was crushed. I drowned my sorrows in cheap beer for three months. This marked my first daily drinking binge as well as the biggest heartbreak I have yet to experience. I remember sitting around with my roommate (who was dumped at the same time) drinking, commiserating and crying while we watched *Full House* and *Friends* reruns.

The other Valentine's Day dumpings are less significant. Both were with short-term dating partners and I was using daily so I don't have a clear memory of either experience. But I do remember feeling sad and bitter and upping my daily intake of substances to further numb myself from the possibility of feeling any pain.

It's safe to say that relationships (especially the end of them) are a huge trigger for me. In the past, I've been very messy when it came to matters of the heart. I often got violent and obsessive when I broke up with people. I remember once showing up at a fresh ex's house at 6 a.m.

still drunk from the night before. I was planning to win him back, but when I entered his house I saw evidence that he'd been on a date the night before. There was an open wine bottle and two glasses on the table. I stormed into his bedroom, screamed and slapped him. Then I proceeded to take the wine bottle and glasses outside and smash them against his house under his bedroom window.

I've now been through two breakups while I was sober. The first set me off on a long relapse that ended a little over two years ago when I found myself suicidal and ready to get sober again. This time around I made a whole-hearted attempt not to get too involved with anyone until I was a bit more stable. I began dating someone around nine months into my sobriety and realized four months later that I was in over my head so I had to end the relationship. For the first time I was able to be honest with someone and break up in an emotionally sober way. There was no hitting, screaming or post-breakup sex. I was honest about my feelings, allowed myself to just feel sad without fighting it and we both moved on with our lives with very little drama.

It felt good not to let a breakup be a license to insanity. I credit my A.A. tools for this obvious sign of growth. I know that left to my own devices, I would have made a ranting idiot of myself. Once again, staying close to my higher power, my sponsor, the steps and meetings paid off.

Soon I was back on the dating horse. I read a book about dating called, If the Buddha Dated. I learned I could just meet people on my journey and not get attached to an outcome. I could treat them and myself respectfully whether the relationship was to move on or not. I previously had little communication or other relationship skills. It was difficult for me to be honest. I continued to practice and get in touch with my feelings by continuing my Twelve Step work and praying for knowledge of HP's will and the power to carry that out.

My best friend and I took a class on dating and relationships. At the end of the semester, a woman in the class told me she had a crush on me. I thought it would be fun to play with her. I was not expecting any commitment, as there was an age difference I thought would prevent any "real" relationship. But she was fun, artistic, creative, jovial, yet complicated and emotional. We started out with casual sex and have now been together a year and a half. We moved in together and are raising a puppy and two cats.

Being in a relationship is still difficult for me at times. When I stopped drinking five years ago, I thought that life would turn around and be all rosy. That is not true. Life still happens. Pain, suffering, difficult issues as well as joy, happiness and success are a combined part of our human life. The same is true for relationships.

My partner and I still fight but try to communicate better each day. We learn and grow with each other and ourselves. Early on, a good program friend spent time with me going over page 69 of the *Big Book* about sex and relationships. I had been feeling and acting immature and impatient and was upset I had no control over this new relationship. Sitting down and reading and working those few pages was very helpful.

We must use this program and the steps in all our affairs, including relationships. This was the one area I really did not want HP in. I had come to believe HP had to be in every other aspect, but please not my bedroom. But now, I am starting to welcome HP there. I am willing and open to understanding HP's will for me. As with every other

Dear Rescuer,

For years I went to a Big Book meeting and felt resentment when we read "To Wives." Today I realize it offers good advice for those of us, male or female, who love an alcoholic. You might want to read it. It is natural to feel sad and even resentful that your partner may have relapsed after five happy sober years together, but if you accuse him or worry about him, you may give him more of an excuse to drink.

The best thing you can do for him is accept him the way he is and take care of your own spiritual condition. Don't suffer alone. Share at meetings. There are many couples where only one is sober. You might also want to check in with our sister program, Al-anon.

Your partner, sober or not, is perfect just the way he is. Act as if you want him to be happy, whether or not he comes back to the program. Love him and let him go. He has his own Higher Power and it isn't you.

Dear Befuddled,

The Family Afterward in Alcoholics Anonymous discusses impotence in early sobriety. If the problem persists more than a few months, "there should be no hesitancy in consulting a doctor or psychologist." Your sponsee should continue to pursue medical and psychological help.

You shared your experience that you were impotent for a full year. He has only suffered for five months. Give him perspective on how long he spent damaging his body as well as his mind, which are equally important components of a happy sex life. Remind him to give himself time to recover.

A Fourth Step and sex inventory may not solve the problem, but it certainly won't hurt. Has he made some Ninth Step amends? Perhaps he feels guilty about something in his past. He is starting a new life and may need to let go of his old ideas about sex. He and his wife may enjoy a better life together in the long run.

Itching to Date

Dear Itching,

You might want to look at two chapters in Living Sober – Fending Off Loneliness and Steering Clear of Emotional Entanglements. Fending Off talks about how alcoholism is a disease of social isolation. Many of us come into A.A. emotionally immature we are still psychological adolescents, awkward and insecure.

Steering Clear reminds us that we are emotionally vulnerable in our first sober days. We are so relieved and happy to have escaped our old life that we tend to grab the first person we are attracted to. Then we crash and burn when the relationship doesn't go our way. Why risk it?

At the same time, we insist on enjoying life. Join a group of sober friends for coffee, go to A.A. dances. Practice your social skills. Just keep it simple until you are on firm ground.

To me, the sponsor-sponsee relationship is the perfect example of A.A. love at work. I recently had a sponsee stop calling me. I worried about her for a while and then began to feel resentful. How could she stop calling me after all the work we'd done together? I found myself obsessing with similar thoughts. After a few weeks, I wanted to call or email her to tell her she was fired, but stopped myself from doing so until I consulted with my own sponsor.

As usual, my sponsor listened to me patiently and then asked me a simple question: Was my desire to call and give this woman the axe coming from resentment or love? Resentment was the honest answer. The loving response in this situation would be to pray for my sponsee's safety and perhaps leave her a message saying I'm available to talk with her, if and when she needs me.

Often I am a judgmental and unforgiving person. This experience with my sponsee is helping me practice patience and tolerance, which are at the core of the philosophy of A.A. Love.

Taking a loving approach to any problem doesn't come second nature to me. That is why I'm so grateful that I have my sponsor and other A.A. friends. These are people who are also practicing living from love. None of us are perfect. At times we make mistakes in our relationships. Sometimes we spill our guts to others and accomplish little but making a mess. But luckily we have each other to check in with. We can offer each other suggestions on how to clean up any mess—and sometimes we can even help each other avoid the sloppy spill to begin with.

Treasures of the Twelve & Twelve: Tradition Two By Kim R.

For our group purpose there is but one ultimate authority—a loving God as he may express Himself in our group conscious. Our leaders are but trusted servants, they do not govern

In my experience, one way God expresses Himself is through another member's share. Then, after hearing that share, I can respond as an "elder diplomat" or a "bleeding deacon."

The Twelve & Twelve describes an elder diplomat as "one who sees the wisdom of the group's decision." This is one who holds no resentment, whose judgment is fortified by considerable experience, and who is willing to sit quietly on the sidelines patiently awaiting developments. The bleeding deacon is one who is "convinced that the group cannot get along without him," who constantly connives, and who continues to be consumed with self-centeredness.

Recently in a meeting, I was acting like a bleeding deacon.

As I understand it, the group conscious sets each meeting format. No secretary has authority to mandate the meeting format. Rather, the secretary follows the meeting format set by the group. Recently, however, a temporary secretary chose to disregard the meeting format at my home group and mandated her own format by beginning the meeting with an outside religious reading. Wait a minute, I thought. She is doing everything wrong. She has unilaterally changed the meeting format. How dare she.

I looked around and noticed that one newcomer was looking bewildered. I saw one old timer leave the meeting. I felt unsafe in the meeting. I attend A.A. meetings to connect with my loving God as I understand Him—not to be force-fed religious readings.

What followed was even more disconcerting to me.

The first person to share in the meeting told a story of her child's alcohol and drug program. The next person shared about her issues, or not, with co-dependency and martyrdom. The next person shared of her sister's Al-Anon program.

Now, to an alcoholic of my type, who got thrown off when the Maria Dock got new chairs or took posters off of its walls, I was beside myself. I was angry that the meeting started with a religious reading, and my anger grew with every share that followed. You see, I like to control

everything from what others say in their share to how they sit in their chair. Stop fidgeting. Don't shake your leg. Quit smacking your gum. Don't lean back in that chair.

Just as I was silently lecturing others, the room burst with laughter. I missed what everyone

was laughing about because I was so consumed with the chatter in my mind, I didn't hear the member's share.

Rather than raise my hand to share what I was going through, I chose to stay in my resentments. I felt more comfortable exercising my superiority and anger. I get energized by my anger. Why ruin that high?

Then, out of nowhere, my God expressed himself through another person in the meeting. This man

said exactly what I was thinking. Suddenly, I realized others felt as I did. Then, I realized a very important lesson: while some felt as I did, others felt differently.

Maybe the temporary secretary wasn't speaking to me. Maybe the first three people to share weren't talking to me. Maybe it isn't all about me and my wants and my desires. Maybe another suffering alcoholic heard the very words out of those first four people that she or he needed to hear to stay sober that day. Maybe God spoke through those first four people but I just didn't hear it because I was consumed with self-centeredness.

After all, haven't we all experienced a loving God express himself in our group conscious. I know I have. I hear exactly what I need to hear in a meeting. I feel better after a meeting. I become more willing to make amends. I witness emotions pour out of people who, by all previous accounts, had no emotions other than anger. I ask for help at meetings.

I realized that I was acting like a bleeding, judgmental deacon and not an elder diplomat. While I still believe that secretaries should follow the meeting format set by the group conscious, I also believe that everything happens for a reason. There are no mistakes.

Thank God this is a program of progress and not perfection because some days I am a bleeding deacon and some days an elder diplomat.

A.A. On the Road: India

Traveling in sobriety is great, and I have been lucky to do a fair amount of it. I traveled when I was still drinking, but have had a lot more fun since getting sober

At the end of my drinking and during my first year sober, I had a job that required travel, so I built up a lot of frequent flyer miles. At first, traveling in sobriety was scary. I had always drunk my way through the trips. I discovered that finding local meetings made all the difference. Initially it just gave me a place to go and something to do other than thinking about drinking—most business travel is just BS and boredom.

At the end of my first year sober, I used some mileage to get to Paris and London. I went to meetings in both places. At three years sober, I took three months and went around the world. Meetings began to enhance the travel in addition to fulfilling their basic function of helping me connect to other alcoholics. Since then I have been to Greece, Turkey, Ecuador, South Africa, Mexico, and Scotland. I traveled with my wife—a fellow recovering alcoholic—on most trips and we often found meetings.

Recently, we were off to India. The weekend before our departure, I shared about the upcoming trip at a meeting. A fellow member had been to India and shared some A.A. resources by email, including this link http://www.AAgsoindia.org/location.htm

Cyber cafes were widely available and email became an important connection for me in India because we had some trouble finding meetings in some places. We found that listings on the web weren't always current.

My first email message to my sponsor: Well it has been intense. So jetlagged in Delhi that we didn't make it to a meeting there. Used the website info to locate a meeting in Jaipur, but all of the listed Jaipur contacts were no longer current and the listed facility had no idea what I was talking about. The A.A. International Directory had no Jaipur listings. Email is helpful and we are glad that we brought both a Big Book and a 12x12. Thanks for the help. It's good to know people are there.

Another email a week later: We have struggled to find meetings. Missed our best chance in Delhi but have another chance in Kolkotta. Today Kathleen and I established the Himalayan Sunrise meeting of the Darjeeling Fellowship on Observatory Hill, a discussion and meditation meeting that may move to Pelling in Sikkim tomorrow. The good news -- both members are still sober. Thanks for your support.

We found a meeting in Calcutta (Kolkatta). The A.A. meeting at St. Thomas School on Market Street happened as advertised. We were a few minutes late owing to the crowds shopping and a lost cab driver. We walked into a room with a dozen or so people (all locals). The steps and traditions were on the wall; a picture of Dr. Bob, Bill Wilson and a *Big Book* were on

Literature Review: *The Language of the Heart:*by Gary D. *Bill W.'s Grapevine Writings*

The alleged origin of sending Valentine's Day cards in the middle of February to loved ones came from a third century A.D. Roman Christian priest named Valentinus. He was jailed by the emperor and during his incarceration sent messages of support, love and encouragement to his fellow Christians. Since the fifth century A.D., St. Valentine's feast day is celebrated on February 14.

While Bill Wilson recognized that neither he nor others in the Fellowship were saints, there is a parallel in Bill's writings in *The Grapevine*. All of the articles deal with Bill's experience, strength and hope and are designed to encourage suffering alcoholics to be free of the bondage of alcoholism.

The Grapevine was established in 1944 as a local newsletter by several New York A.A. members. Through the efforts of a few, in 1945 *The Grapevine* became the principle journal of the Fellowship. Since 1949 it has been known as the international journal of Alcoholics Anonymous. From the inception of *The Grapevine* and up to the time of his death over a period of 26 years, Bill Wilson contributed over 150 articles. In 2002, The A.A. Grapevine, Inc. published *The Language of the Heart*, which is a compilation of virtually all of Bill's contributions. Some articles will be familiar.

Exceptions of articles not contained in *The Language of the Heart* are those written by Bill between 1952 and 1953, which were later reprinted as the *Twelve Steps and Twelve Traditions*. For the sake of keeping the book at an acceptable length, the editors decided to omit these articles since they are readily available in book form. The only other omissions are Bill's brief Thanksgiving and Christmas greetings to the fellowship with the exception of the Christmas 1970. This message is included because it was Bill's last *Grapevine* piece.

The Language of the Heart is divided into three parts. Each part contains an introduction by the editors outlining what was happening within the Fellowship during the designated time frame.

Part One covers the period from 1944 to 1950 and is divided into two segments: *The Shaping of the Traditions* and *Additional Writings From This Period*. Besides covering each of the twelve traditions, this part of the book deals with a variety of topics which helped form the A.A. organization such as: 1) the safe use of money, 2) who is a member of A.A., 3) the dangers of linking A.A. to other projects, 4) the importance of A.A. being self-supporting, and 5) the importance of anonymity.

My wife's contact was the one other woman in the group who was grateful for Kathleen's presence. She said she is often the only woman in meetings.

They closed the meeting saying an A.A. Prayer that ends with the Serenity Prayer. Once again, I felt at home and grateful half way around the world.



Maybe this is what they were talking about when they said, "We are not a glum lot!"

While every retreat is "the best ever," the December retreat was especially memorable. Part Two covers the period from 1950 to 1958. It includes three segments: A.A. Grows to Maturity, Let's be Friendly with

our Friends, and Additional Writings From This Period. These articles deal with subjects such as Bill's reflections on A.A. coming of age, the necessity of service, how A.A.'s world service grew, and the fact that A.A. is not like a big business. The second segment addresses Bill's thoughts on physicians, psychiatrists, clergy and the media.

Part Three covers Bill's contributions from 1958 through 1970. It is also broken into three segments: All our Affairs, Looking Toward the Future, and Additional Writings From This Period. The first segment contains the article from which this book derived its name: The Language of the Heart. This article deals with the importance of honestly acknowledging one's addiction to alcohol and sincerely asking a higher power for help. It is a message of love and hope for all that suffer from alcoholism. Segment two looks at the growth of the A.A. movement and considers the importance of proper leadership and communication within and outside the Fellowship.

The last two chapters of the book contain Bill's reflections about some of the early members of A.A., including a tribute to Dr. Bob, the other co-founder of A.A. written in January of 1951.

All of Bill Wilson's contributions to *The Grapevine* are written from the heart. *The Language of the Heart* is available at the Central Office bookstore and would make a wonderful Valentine's Day gift for friends or family in the Fellowship.
