Just What IS This Higher Power Thing Anyway?

I was watching two guys working on a car the other day. They were looking under the hood, scratching their heads like they didn't know what the heck was wrong with this vehicle. Apparently, there was no power to run the car and they could find no explanation why.

It got me thinking about the power that runs my body and my life. I can have a lot of outside influences try to get me running or otherwise fix me, but if I don't have the willingness or desire to accept these outside influences and transform them to work on a day-to-day basis, I could end up like that car and have no solution



whatsoever to get me back on the road again.

Anyway, the power in my life really has nothing to do with me. I am an instrument that a Power greater than myself can use to carry a message to others and make me a stronger person. I need to remember to do the work—to use the "fuel" from my Higher Power in an efficient way so I can continue to run smoothly and not waste the gifts that result. There have been many times when I think that I have all of the answers and that I don't need anyone or anything else to get me through the day. That is when I end up restless and irritable and basically not much use to anyone. I might as well be that car at the side of road that doesn't work. When I allow the Power greater than me to enter my mind and life, miraculous things always happen and I find myself at peace with a serenity that I have spent my entire life trying to find. It's funny how quickly I can forget this and go back to my old fuel-<code>inefficient</code> ways.

What is this Higher Power energy cell? I am not sure. What I do know is that I don't necessarily need to know this or many other answers anyway and that the results are far better than knowing them. I can run with the other "vehicles" on the road and keep on running knowing that my power is not mine at all.

Thanks To My Sponsor

I spoke at a meeting recently, and my sponsor Barbara was there right in the front row. The week before, at the same meeting, Barbara's sponsor Jill had been the speaker, and Barbara sat right in front. It amazes me how wisdom is passed down from A.A. generation to generation. I've even heard some San Francisco A.A.s use the terms grand-sponsor and grand sponsee. I think the idioms are fitting.

As I watched my grand sponsor Jill the week before I spoke, I was given a moment to focus on the solution, as she talked almost solely about her recovery. It was a stunning reminiscence, as she simultaneously looked back at her journey, ahead with the wisdom she'd garnered, and presently, generously passed these gifts to anyone in the room who would have them.

I realized that I not only identified with Jill's story, I also identified much with her recovery. We don't chat often, but I felt as if she were a part of my A.A. family. I held her in the esteem of a wise elder, truly grand. I hadn't been asked to speak yet, but I remember walking home and thanking Jill for being a great sponsor to my sponsor.

Jill recalled the phrase she learned from her sponsor, "*This too shall pass*." I'd heard it before I stopped drinking, but the prayer never worked until I re-learned it in the fellowship of A.A., when Barbara, with her calm and serene, but stalwart voice repeated it to me many times over during a rough couple of months.

My relationship with Barbara has traveled a winding path, but she has always remained by my side, or in the front row. I haven't yet actively sought a sponsee. And I don't know if I'm "ready yet." But I do believe that the opportunity will present itself in God's time. When this happens, I will be honored to carry the message from Jill's sponsor to Jill to Barbara to me to my sponsee. This lineage is so powerful, and although it seems many sponsors are older than their sponsees, it need not be the case at all.

Our place in this genealogy, and if we have a sponsor, we all have a place in it, connects us directly with the very founders of A.A. What a reminder of the union and solidarity we alcoholics share with one another. The thought always keeps me from feeling alone. Even if a recovering alcoholic is floating somewhere in international waters, or traveling the world with a knapsack, or still fearful of leaving home, she is part of a vast network of love and wisdom. I'd bet much less than six-degrees away.

A.A. is self-supporting. Central Office needs your support!

Dear Alky questions and answers from one a.a. to another!

Dear Alky,

One of my sponsees moved to the East Bay several years ago. We talk on the phone and even get together occasionally, but we don't go

to the same meetings any more. She still considers me her sponsor and once in a while even calls with a program-related issue. But I'm not comfortable with the situation. I feel as if she should get a sponsor in her new town. How do I tell her this? Or should I just keep my big mouth shut and turn it over?

Dear Out of Town,

If you feel your sponsee should find a new sponsor, simply tell her so. Remind her that it's not personal (no matter how her alcoholic mind might try to trick her into believing it is), and that you have her

sobriety uppermost in mind. Also, it might help to explain why you're suggesting it. Finally, I've found it helpful, when encouraging sponsees to move on, to wait until they've found a new sponsor, and then to have a final meeting at which we finish the relationship on a high note. There's great spiritual growth in ending a relationship lovingly as opposed to destructively—the unevolved alcoholic's usual stock in trade.

Dear Alky,

I find that my sponsor of many years may no longer be right for me—or me for him. He's out of town and out of touch for long stretches. My A.A. service experience has led me into dynamic relationships with several other gentlemen of active sobriety whom I consider possible sponsor material. Can you shed some light on the sense of foreboding I get whenever I consider changing sponsors?

Dear Quandry,

Changing sponsors isn't easy. Like all points of spiritual growth, it pushes us beyond our comfort zone. It's possible that your foreboding derives from an obsession with self. The

Big Book tells us on page 62 that we're driven by "a hundred forms of fear, self-delusion, self-seeking and self-pity." Yours sounds like a fear of the unknown. The antidote to fear is God. Turn to your higher power in prayer and ask for guidance, then talk with

fellow A.A.s. God's guidance often comes to us through the humans we know and trust. Sponsor-sponsee relationships aren't marriages; they're relationships in which one alcoholic helps another—and, in so doing, stays sober himself. When they've outlasted their usefulness, it's right to lovingly end them.

Dear Alky,

I definitely fall into the agnostic camp (and sometimes even the atheist one) when analyzing and discussing God. Yet in the glow of sobriety I'm in

touch with the vast goodness and selfless love that I see in the world and in our program. I pray modestly in times of stress but overwhelmingly in times of joy and gratitude, using the old standby the Lord's Prayer. I can never square the one mindset with the other. Would you say this is risky business?

Dear Anonymous,

What's risky about it? You sound like you're finding your way through Steps Two and Three. Chapter Four of the Big Book, titled "We Agnostics," lays out the case with surgical skill. Many who come to A.A. as atheists or agnostics have experiences like yours. Some of them come to identify the feeling you describe—a kind of Oneness—as a manifestation of their higher power. This program's founders had the rare foresight to suggest we find God as we understood Him, which leaves plenty of room to discover the Realm of the Spirit. In the end, labels don't much matter—they're constructs of the mind. Whether atheist, agnostic or "believer," the key is that we've been relieved of the drink obsession by a power not associated with—and greater than—our individual wills, which didn't succeed in stopping the juggernaut of alcoholism. Enjoy your newfound gratitude—and don't sweat the rest.

Prayer & Meditation

When I first came into A.A., I did not have a relationship with a God of any understanding. I understood getting drunk, and that's what motivated me. When I needed help, I got drunk. When I had nothing to do, I got drunk. When I had something to do, I would put it off, and get drunk. I was sure the drink would fix me. It made me feel good thinking about drinking, but not even the drinking made me feel better. So then I got to A.A., and heard about this God thing in meetings. People talked about having a Higher Power and how they felt better. They trusted something would help them.

What were they talking about!?! I had no idea. I wanted proof that this God thing would help me. It seemed as though every time I asked for something, I didn't get it. So where was God? My life had been a daily torment. I didn't believe anything could help me.

People introduced the idea of pretending to believe in something. My life wasn't working. It had to get better. So I prayed to a God that I didn't believe in. More to the point, I prayed to a God that I hated because I believed It had personally ruined my life. I prayed with clenched teeth and fists and demanded that It help me. It was a start.

It probably took a few years of practicing praying and being angry at God until I started to have faith. I tried many different faiths, other people's faiths, anything from Christianity to Buddhism to Paganism to any New Age oracle you can come up with. Eventually I developed my own concept of a Higher Power. I took pieces of those other faiths and used them and then added my own stuff, stuff I discovered on my own. I started to pray when I was having a hard time, and I wasn't bitter about it. Then I would give thanks to this God of my understanding. Eventually, I was praying on a daily basis, giving thanks and asking for guidance to be of service. Now when I say 'eventually', I mean it took me over 15 years to develop the relationship with my Higher Power that I have today and it is all through practicing praying and meditating.

The meditation was easier for me because it was something I could do. I didn't need to have faith in anything to meditate. I just sat down and breathed. I started meditating when I had about 7 years sober. I was in a crisis in my recovery. I was in an abusive relationship and had started self-mutilating again. Something had to change. I don't even remember how I got the idea, maybe I heard it in a meeting but I started meditating in the morning a few days a week. It was only for 5 minutes at a time. Then several months later I increased it to 10 minutes, and so on.

Now I make time in the morning to meditate for 20 to 30 minutes and then pray. My meditation is still simply just sitting and breathing. In my prayer, I give thanks and ask to be of service.

Treasures of the Twelve & Twelve: Tradition Ten

Alcoholics Anonymous has no opinion on outside issues;

hence the A.A. name ought never be drawn into public controversy.

This month we plumb the depths of the twenty-second chapter of Twelve Steps and Twelve Traditions, the chapter about A.A.'s Tenth Tradition.

Sometimes reading the "back twelve" of the Twelve & Twelve is like watching a movie with a high-speed car chase. As the cars careen around mountainous corners above precipitous drops to what would surely be a fiery death in twisted metal and glass, we sit on the edge of our seats in nervous anticipation of the fate the drivers avoid by a margin of inches. Likewise, the history of A.A. tradition is fraught with close calls and would-be disaster, avoided just in time by the adoption of these principles that keep the fellowship alive.

In the chapter on Tradition Ten, we're treated to a more vivid example. Instead of the example of early A.A. members learning the necessity of the Tradition the hard way, we read of a society which shared a lot with Alcoholics Anonymous in its day but which ceased to exist subsequent to involving itself in outside affairs: The Washingtonian Society.

As is spelled out in the chapter, the Washingtonians were a nineteenth century movement that had some notable success with a spiritual solution to alcoholism. The movement was popular in the years leading up to the American Civil War, and is remembered almost exclusively by historians who keep archives of Abraham Lincoln's speeches and writings. Honest Abe addressed the Washingtonians at least twice, and in these speeches reveals an understanding of alcoholism surprising for a Nineteenth Century man:

"In my judgment such of us as have never fallen victims have been spared more by the absence of appetite than from any mental or moral superiority over those who have. Indeed, I believe if we take habitual drunkards as

a class, their heads and their hearts will bear an

advantageous comparison with those of any other class. There seems ever to have been a proneness in the brilliant and warm-blooded to fall into this vice — the demon of intemperance ever seems to have delighted in sucking the blood of genius and of generosity. What one of us but can call to mind some relative, more

promising in youth than all his fellows, who has fallen a sacrifice to his rapacity?"

While wrapped up in the language of yesteryear (I know, this can be more difficult than reading the Big Book), Abe said something vital here that was not echoed again for a few decades. The idea that alcoholism is not a moral issue but rather an obsession (or an "appetite") flies in the face of the conventional thought of the time. But the Washingtonians,

a society of "reformed drunkards" had this idea!

In the same speech, Abe seems to speak presciently on the topic of A.A.'s traditions, over a century before our Twelve Traditions were adopted.

"And again, it is so common and so easy to ascribe motives to men of these classes other than those they profess to act upon. The preacher, it is said, advocates temperance because he is a fanatic, and desires a union of the church and state; the lawyer from his pride and vanity of hearing himself speak; and the hired agent for his salary. But when one who has long been known as a victim of intemperance bursts the fetters that have bound him... there is a logic and an eloquence in it that few with human feelings can resist. They cannot say that he desires a union of church and state, for he is not a church member; they cannot say he is vain of hearing himself speak, for his whole demeanor shows he would gladly avoid speaking at all; they cannot say he speaks for pay, for he receives none, and asks for none. Nor can his sincerity in any way be doubted, or his sympathy for those he would persuade to imitate his example be denied."

A.A. On the Road: Brooklyn

The most common advice I hear from my sponsor is, "Get to a meeting." So that's what I do. Before I go anywhere for any length of time—from a weekend in Baja to a month in Brooklyn—I search the Internet (name of the city + Alcoholics Anonymous), get a meeting schedule, and then I'm good to go. I often plan my itinerary around A.A. meetings and events. During my most recent trip to see my family in Brooklyn, I planned to attend noon meetings in the neighborhood every day, go to the General Service Office in Manhattan and listen to an old speaker tape of my father (who joined A.A. in 1948 and passed away in 1980), and spend a few days helping with the newsletter mailing at the Wilson House in Vermont. Nice plans, but my Higher Power apparently had other ideas.

Babysitting my 2-year-old niece thwarted any regular attendance at the Midday Sobriety group, the speaker tapes were packed away in boxes to be digitized and were not accessible, and a first-week back injury left me unable to make the five-hour drive to rural Vermont. Finally, on my last day in town, I took the subway all the way up to the G.S.O. only to find I had just missed their once-weekly meeting. My great A.A. odyssey wasn't panning out.

Then the little miracle happened, though I didn't yet realize it. My volunteer tour guide at G.S.O. introduced me to the speaker from the meeting I had just missed. He was Ron C., an Australian man with more than 51 years of continuous sobriety. He wrote the preface to the Aussie Big Book, and his story is in it. After the tour, Ron and I sat and talked for at least a half-hour. I cried as I told him how much I had hoped to hear my father's voice after 35 years and how I had missed my chance to go to the Wilson House. He totally understood my disappointment and tried to comfort me.

"When are you leaving?" he asked gently.

"Tomorrow," I replied.

"Can you change your flight?" he asked. "The annual picnic at Stepping Stones is tomorrow. You really shouldn't miss it."

Then he explained that Stepping Stones was Bill and Lois Wilson's home until they died and that there has always been an A.A. picnic there on the first Saturday in June. Ron had been a close friend of Lois's and had stayed there many times. He offered to give me a personal tour if I could arrange to go. It was an inexpensive one-hour train ride from Manhattan and the picnic was free. I decided to change my flight and go to Stepping Stones. It turned out to be one of the highlights of my A.A. life thus far.

Ron took me through the house and shared stories in every room. I checked out the many metaphysical and occult titles in the bookcases of the "Spook Room," where Bill W. had hosted séances and played with Ouija boards in an attempt to remain open to all spiritual ideas. I saw the handwritten letter he had scribbled to Lois after his first meeting with Dr. Bob. We stood and chatted around the very kitchen table where Bill and his first sponsor, Ebby, had argued until Ebby finally suggested that Bill find a God of his own understanding. These people, our founders, became absolutely real to me as I realized that nothing had changed ~ A.A. is still all about one alcoholic helping another.



Literature Review

Portable Primers, Tuckable Treasures



Two portable primers were slipped into my tote this afternoon—two treasures—A.A. pamphlets written with women in mind: "Letter to a Woman Alcoholic", written in 1954 and "A.A. for the Woman" issued in 1976. While they do reflect the prevailing sen-

timents of their time, they are also fairly transcendental and express the core of the alcoholic experience of many women I know.

Many of us women feel that the tough guy tone in a lot of the traditional A.A. literature leaves us behind. Maybe many guys may need their egos cut down to size, but most of ours need to be peeled off the floor. Sure, I had my days of bravado, but at the end I was the quiet little drinker, miserably caught like a hamster in its wheel—work, drink, pass out; work, drink, pass out—the sad gal upstairs.

"Letter to a Woman" Alcoholic sounds like a woman doctor writing to a few women in the neighborhood. It was probably revolutionary for its time, published in Redbook Magazine in 1954, bringing the hidden alcoholic woman into the light. It begins with vivid descriptions, addressing the different types of alcoholic women, in various stages of misery. Then it tells us that we are not alone—and highlights the common triggers of alcoholism and emotional issues that propel so many deeper into the affliction. It conveys the physical allergy and mental obsession very neatly.

All that sadness fills the first few pages while the subsequent ones express the hope and healing in A.A. very well. It explains the strength of turning things over quite precisely. I also loved the description of "the mellow laughter, which can come only from people who have looked destruction and catastrophe in the face, not once but continuously over long years, and are now free and unafraid." I could see sharing some passages with non-alcoholics, to help them understand.

But there are disappointing parts in the purple prose—for someone who may still be struggling with weight management, the repeated declarations that the alcoholic woman who was fat and blowsy was now attractive could be a tad demoralizing. And the God statements are just a bit too charming—like after the lovely mellow laughter passage comes the sentence "The laughter, in short, of people who hold God's hand and feel safe."

"A.A. for the Woman" definitely feels more contemporary, if only because it dives right into the individual stories pretty quickly. I was glad about that because the first page has 15 Questions, targeted to women and I bristled at "Do you reward yourself with a little drinking bout after you've worked hard in the house?" as Question Three. But on the other hand I had to admit that the targeted questions were effective. I certainly bought my little half pints in different places to disguise the amount I consumed (or so I thought). And yes I did "phone the hostess of a party" to find out if I'd made a fool of myself.

So once I relaxed and looked for the similarities, I was glad to see a few pages about what A.A. has learned about alcoholism, followed by some great stories. And the stories are well selected to show the broad range of drunk broads there are in the world—from waitress to doctor to mom and grandma. I was thinking, as I folded back the cover to discreetly read it on the bus, that I was lucky to have such a portable piece of the Big Book—and all the stories were from women. The stories also reflected different points of view—from the tragic, to the tough independent, the neurotic dual-addicted woman, the "lace curtains" housewife and the barfly. Both of these pamphlets provide an excellent introduction to A.A.. One is more dramatic and emotionally appealing; the other is more reflective of the range of experiences of A.A. women today. I would definitely recommend them to you and your sponsees.

A Fresh Start

Like most of us, I have not experienced a searing epiphany in which God came to me in a blinding flash. So when I am feeling troubled or confused, I sometimes wonder if I am kidding myself about having had a "real" spiritual awakening. I know my life has changed radically since I joined Alcoholics Anonymous a few years ago and I know that prayer works for me, but since I haven't "seen God," I'm not sure who or what I am praying to. One of my spiritual teachers, a Zen master, suggested that I pray to the God that feels most natural to me, even if it is the kindly old man-in-the-sky of my childhood, an image I don't really believe any more.

"It's just a raft," he told me. "It's not the shore." In his view, whatever makes me comfortable with prayer is good. The most important thing is simply that I pray and give my problems back to the universe, where they belong.

All of that was fine and dandy, but it didn't really resolve the question of whether or not I have had an authentic spiritual experience. Wouldn't I know it, if I had? Wouldn't I be sure about God? I was in a bit of a tizzy about the whole thing, so I prayed for faith. I didn't pray for a sign because I couldn't be sure I'd recognize it. (Yes, I am a real alcoholic.)

Shortly thereafter I got a message in my e-mail that ultimately led me to the *Grapevine* archives, where I read this message written by Bill Wilson in 1962:

"When AAs come to me, hoping to find out how one comes by those sudden experiences, I simply tell them in all probability that they have had one just as good – and that theirs is identical excepting it has been strung out over a longer period of time. Then I go on to say that if their transformation in A.A. extending over six months had been condensed into six minutes – well, they then might have seen the stars too!"

That made sense to me. I had a friend back in the Sixties who used to do that sort of thing all of the time. He called it a "consciousness comparison." When I compared the alienated, anxious, angry, and thoroughly hopeless woman of a few years ago to the thriving, happy person who has more friends than she can keep up with today, I could easily see a transformation that amounts to nothing less than a full-scale spiritual experience.

I'm glad mine happened gradually. I probably wouldn't have known how to handle it if it had been given to me all of a sudden. As I said earlier, I'm not so sure I would have recognized a burning bush if it was right in front of me. Thankfully, what I got instead was a fresh start, a program of recovery that let me wake up one step at a time. That's a spiritual experience I can use every day.

The Too Early Group

Every Saturday morning I get up early and head out to my home group, which meets at St. Dominic's School, at Pierce and Pine Streets, in San Francisco. The Too Early Group is a Big Book study meeting that starts at 8 a.m. Over a period of two to three years, we read the Big Book cover to cover. Each week, we pick up where we left off the week before and read until someone is moved to share about the reading. Usually, we then proceed to share on that topic for the rest of the meeting. Since 1986, when the group was founded, the group has read the Big Book seven times (including every footnote and appendix). Since March 2003, we have been working our way through the fourth edition for the first time.

This meeting has taught me an incredible amount about AA and sobriety. Week after week, members share their perspectives on spiritual principles and living a sober life, and share their understanding of the fellowship's "basic text". I hear many things that I might never "get" on my own. Just as important, Too Early's members like to laugh and truly care about their sobriety and each other. The group includes people in early, middle and long-term sobriety. Newcomers are welcomed and encouraged to participate. For someone who used to spend Saturday morning recovering from the night before, this meeting is a joy and mainstay of my spiritual life.

Following is an unofficial summary of actions, information, upcoming business and service opportunities discussed at the September 2005 IFB meeting. It is provided for your convenience and it is not intended to be the completed approved minutes. For a complete copy of the minutes, contact the Central Office.

1. IFB Reports

Chair's Report: Steve R. gave the report. Central Office staffed a table at the Spirit of San Francisco Convention but because of location, the table received few visitors. Central Office will have a table at Marin Unity Day and will co-host San Francisco Unity Day on Oct. 29. The summary of the Ad Hoc Committee Huddles on how to get and keep new members is as follows: 1) keep it fun, 2) reach out to the IFB and fellowship at large, 3) build database of skills and availability of members, 4) mentor new members.

Treasurer's Report: Danna P. gave the report. The net loss for January through July was (\$1,742) which is \$13,321 less than the budgeted net loss of (\$15,063). The net income in July of \$4,114 exceeded the budgeted net income of \$2,401 by \$1,713. Unrestricted cash as of July 31, 2005 totaled \$24,922 and is no longer sufficient to pay the budgeted expenses totaling \$33,700 for the next two months. Unrestricted cash increased by \$5,729 primarily due to the net income in July.

Central Office Manager's Report: Maury P. gave the report. Maury is now at the office 30 hours a week. With her increase in hours, she hopes to spend more time with the committees and help facilitate their work. All regular phone shifts are covered. She attended the Northern California Central Office Managers seminar on Friday, August 12th, the focus being on comparison of each's Intergroup structure. Maury is going to the Annual Intergroup Managers Seminar in North Carolina and will be out of the office from 9/22-10/3.

Motion: The Central Office staff, in consultation of the Central Office Committee, will be responsible for determining the amount, type, and recipients of donation.

Favor - 35, Opposed - 2, Abstain - 7, Motion passed.

How ironic it is that despite these words that sound like reinforcement of the values the society already embraced, the Washingtonians would stray from their singleness of purpose, and involve themselves in the public controversies regarding the legal prohibition of alcohol and the abolition of slavery. Abe said it in perhaps overly flowery prose, but still clearly: the Washingtonians' credibility, and therefore their survival as a group, rested on their refusal to confuse themselves by alliance with issues of the preacher, of the lawyer, or the hired agent. This was the pillar on which they could credit their effectiveness in helping drunkards recover from their alcoholism. With a group doing such work, it's a wonder we aren't all recovering members of the Washingtonian Society today.

But the Washingtonian Society never adopted A.A.'s Tenth Tradition. As much as the membership might have understood this when Abe Lincoln spoke to them in 1842, the Washingtonians did take to the soapbox on outside issues, divided their membership with stormy debate, and lost their effectiveness at carrying the message to the suffering alcoholic.

Perhaps this seems like academic historical rambling, but what does it have to do with A.A.? Well, just imagine if A.A. started taking sides on political issues and involving itself in any outside controversy. Imagine if A.A. existed without the protection of the Tenth Tradition. Imagine if A.A. were to divide over some fiery controversy and in the space of a few years ceased to exist. We can't afford to let our solution slip away and be diluted by any outside cause, no matter how good.

Turn It Over

Before sitting down to write this article I wrote a spot-check fear inventory. Within the next couple of days, I need to have a conversation that will be difficult for me, yet has been a long time coming.

People were a large part of why I drank. I drank to please them, in fear of them, and to simply fit in. As a result, I never mastered the proper execution of the dreaded B-word—*Boundaries*. Armed with a new sponsor and the suggested assignment of going deeper into my sex inventory, I'm closely examining my people patterns in past romantic relationships, with past sex partners, and even with past bosses. This upcoming conversation will be with an ex of mine with whom I am still friends.

Before sitting down to write the inventory, I meditated for five minutes. My cat hopped up in my lap as he often does when I meditate. I asked God for guidance in writing the inventory, this article, and guiding me toward what I need to say in this conversation to end a friendship. That, to me, is the pure essence of *Turning It Over*—drop into prayer or meditation, ask God for guidance, and let go of the results.

I know the next right steps I need to take here: make a list of talking points for the conversation, review with my sponsor, and make the call. Uncomfortable as it might be, I know deep down it's the right thing to do.

Another example of turning it over is that cat I just mentioned, the one who likes to meditate with me. He arrived because of just showing up for life, turning it over, and letting go of the results. Last spring, my first sponsor suggested I get a cat. My roommate and I headed over to the SPCA one Sunday afternoon. I was determined to leave that day with a cat (my will). I did not want to wait. But it turned out the kitten he and I both liked that day had terminal kidney failure. After much deliberation, we decided to pass on him.

However, there was a second cat that day named Wilbur whom I thought was OK, but we decided to leave. As we continued to run our errands, I adamantly told my roommate I wanted to go back for Wilbur (again, my will). My roommate, also in the program, said, "Let's wait a few weeks and go back. If that other cat is still there, then it's probably meant for us to adopt him." Still sulking, I agreed.

One month later, I found myself on a first lunch date with someone who volunteered at the SPCA. I relayed my cat story, and he suggested I look at two new cats when I went that weekend.

I never did have a second date with him, but three days later found myself at the SPCA, names of the suggested cats in hand. Both my roommate and I fell in love with one named Cole, and we adopted him. The cat and I only found each other because I put my will in check and followed the signs being presented to me. That, to me, is *Turning It Over*.
