THE FIRST WOMAN IN A.A. WAS A MANN! by Kathleen C.

arty Mann was the first woman in Alcoholics Anonymous. Daughter of a wealthy family, she lacked for nothing but fell far before landing in A.A., finding sobriety through her physician and the Big Book. She panicked at her first meeting, in the Brooklyn home of Lois and Bill Wilson. Instead of joining the meeting downstairs, she threw herself sobbing on the pile of coats in an upstairs bedroom where Lois comforted her.

"We're waiting for you below, and we want you." Trembling, Marty followed Lois downstairs. The group consisted of five or six men, much older than she, and a few of their wives. The men began firing questions at her, the most significant being: "When was your last drink?"

To her surprise she answered honestly, something she hadn't done even to her own doctor. Without missing a beat, she was talking openly and freely to all these strangers, as if they were her closest, most intimate friends.

"I could finish their sentences! They could finish my sentences! We talked each other's language! It was not a

room of strangers. These were my people. I had come home."

Bill became Marty's A.A. sponsor and later heard her Fifth Step. Marty and Lois also became close friends. Marty later said, "Lois did as much for me as any alcoholic."

Bill Wilson and Marty Mann both were visionary, charismatic, open-minded and entrepreneurial. One early member described her as "an attractive, intelligent young woman with tremendous charm . . . possessing a drive which Bill immediately spotted as equal to his own."

In 1940, Marty landed a job as fashion publicity director at Macy's. There she met Priscilla Peck. Marty "Twelfth-Stepped" Priscilla into A.A. around 1943. By then, they had fallen in love. They were together for nearly forty years, until Marty's death in 1980.

By the early 1940's, women in Akron A.A. had started a women's group and the first black group, founded in Cleveland, was centered around a woman, so there were two minorities involved. Women's meetings were safe

TO HUSBANDS

It's Big Book meeting night. The hour is drawing to a close. We have just finished reading "Working with Others" and sharing about it. As we stand in the circle saying the Our Father together, I catch my sponsor's eye. Amid the postmeeting hubbub and chatter we confer solemnly. "You know what comes next." I say. "Yeah, our favorite chapter." She replies. "Not!" I say. "So where shall we have dinner next week?" We make dinner plans in lieu of attending next week's meeting. Why? Because we can't stand "To Wives."

We know it is heresy to reject any of the Big Book but suspect we are not alone in disliking the admonitions (written by a woman but heavily edited by Bill W.) to the female family members of male alcoholics. "Try not to condemn your alcoholic husband no matter what he says or does." Treat the alcoholic gently, with kid gloves. Don't be angry at him, don't berate him for all

(*"The First Woman in AA.," continued from page 1*) sanctuaries, much as they are today. Newly-sober women could share their experience, strength and hope, find sponsors and speak freely without worrying what the men in A.A. thought of them.

Marty wasn't shy about reminding early male A.A.'s about the special stigma suffered by the woman alcoholic and how it was a barrier to sobriety. Men in the 1930's and 40's were creatures of their culture, having the same prejudices and misconceptions as anyone else regarding women alcoholics. Dr. Bob was himself aghast at the prospect of women coming into the Akron group, although he eventually relented and became supportive. Some men objected to women joining their groups because they thought they looked Suck it up and do the dang household chores yourself.

the crap he's done. "These family dissensions are very dangerous, especially to your husband. Often you must carry the burden of avoiding them or keeping them under control." Then even after he gets sober, don't complain if he spends every night of the week at meetings, leaving you to take care of the kids.

We both have alcoholics in our families, living and dead, and have seen how either we or our female relatives bore the brunt of the alcoholic's wreckage. The admonitions in this chapter spark a firestorm of resentments. After a few readings over the years, though, (sometimes we fail to anticipate accu-

shabby and hung over. Marty was there to remind them, "Remember how *you* looked when you first came in?"

Many women members in early A.A. had been divorced or abandoned by husbands who wouldn't tolerate an alcoholic wife. They were vulnerable to inappropriate attention in meetings from men who were barely sober themselves. Many women had been sheltered by their families because of the same stigma and didn't suffer the obvious economic and social consequences of men alcoholics. A.A. men didn't realize at first how "skid row" for such a woman could be a horrible place right in her own home.

Lois Wilson and Anne Smith, Dr. Bob's wife, were the most sympathetic to the women drunks and often worked with them, even taking them and their chilby Anonymous

rately and it sneaks up on us) for some unknown reason a ray of light shines through the clouds and realization dawns. We are the alcoholics. We are the ones who should be treated gently and not provoked or blamed. Hey, this is a good thing! So from now on, when I read, "To Wives," I think to myself, "To Husbands."

Be nice to your alcoholic wife (sister, daughter, mother). Don't let her get too hungry, angry, lonely or tired. Don't criticize her if the house is a mess and there is no supper on the table and the kids are in dirty rags. Suck it up and do the dang household chores yourself. Then, if she gets sober in A.A., let her go to a meeting every night of the week with her A.A. girls and be happy she's sober. With this slight alteration in mind, I can even go to the Big Book meeting the nights we read "To Wives." Substitution, that's one of the tools of sobriety!

dren into their homes.

In addition to Twelfth Step work with individual women alcoholics, Marty set out to educate the world about alcoholism. The vehicle for this monumental accomplishment was the National Council on Alcoholism, which she founded, directed and represented for thirty-five years, until her death in 1980.

Marty wrote "Women Suffer Too," a chapter which first appeared in the Pioneers section of the Second Edition of *Alcoholics Anonymous*. She also wrote a book, *Primer on Alcoholism*, first published in 1950. She spoke at A.A. conferences and roundups. Helen K., a Bay Area A.A. member sober since 1954, remembers Marty as an inspiring speaker. Today, women in A.A. participate fully at all levels. For that, we owe Marty Mann a debt of gratitude.



I read recently that San Francisco is not a very child-friendly city. That's the way I feel about SF A.A. I have a young son, 18 months old, and I often can't get a babysitter when I need a meeting, not that I could necessarily afford to hire someone. My husband is working and going to school at night, and trying to stay sober himself, so I can't really expect him to babysit. There are only two childcare meetings that I know of but they are in the Haight and nowhere near where I live. Plus they are in the middle of the day how does that help mothers like me who are working, even if only parttime? I took my son to my home group a few times, but there were complaints about his walking around during the meeting and the group took a group conscience and decided that children would not be allowed at the meeting. A toddler can't be expected to sit still for an

hour. I see more people bring dogs into A.A. meetings than children. What is wrong with this picture? Don't parents of little kids need meetings too? When is A.A. in San Francisco going to do something to help people like me stay sober?

Dear Mom,

Sounds like you are nursing a "justifiable" resentment. . . As indelicate as it might seem, Alky simply must point out to you that your child's behavior in the meeting, while perfectly normal for a toddler, was obviously disruptive to the other participants. The First Tradition puts the well-being of the group as a whole ahead of that of the individual alcoholic—A.A. simply can't be everything to everyone and some groups feel that such restrictions better serve their primary purpose. Other groups, however, are much more "loose" about what is considered disruptive.

While Alky recognizes that having a young child certainly makes getting to meetings

more difficult, there are options that you perhaps have not considered. If you have other sober friends with children, perhaps you could trade off watching one another's children so that each of you could make at least one meeting each week. Or you could ask a friend who doesn't have kids but enjoys spending time with them—Alky knows lots of such folks and they are usually honored to spend a couple of hours with a friend's child, especially when doing so will support your sobriety. You might also do as some other A.A. parents that I know, and host a meeting for other parents in your home each week, with the parents alternating who goes into another room to supervise the kids.

And by all means, keep looking for childfriendly meetings—or start one of your own! The Alano Club has a Saturday morning children-welcome meeting that you could certainly support. Remember, it's your sobriety—and therefore your responsibility to do the footwork, rather than simply asking what A.A. can do for you.

General Service Representatives (GSRs) are getting group consciences on Agenda Topics for the 57th General Service Conference, such as consider the addition of the following, from The AA Service Manual "Financial Support: Current experience indicates that many groups provide financial support for the general service representatives to attend service functions" to the "Self Support: Where Money and Spirituality Mix" pamphlet. Your GSR might also ask about the Conference Workshop Topic "Spiritual Value of Our AA Dollars". One question is "Am I hesitant to ask other AA members to contribute, or to dig a little deeper, if they can? Why?" The theme of the 2007 conference is "Our 12th Step Responsibility-Are We Going to Any Length?" One discussion item around the theme is: Humility and Responsibility; Raising Literature Prices or Footing the Bill?

Remember the conscience is not a vote and is attained through loving discussion, Tradition Two and likely during sharing session(s) held independent of the business and recovery meetings. Someone, ideally the Alternate GSR will take notes. Eventually all consciences makes their way to the conference in NY.

You can participate in the conference process by attending your group's Sharing Session(s) hosted by your GSR or attending the District 10 Agenda Topics Workshop on March 10th in San Rafael and you can contact your District Committee Member (DCM), before April 13. On April 14th and 15th the GSRs and DCMs will be in Ukiah delivering group consciences to the CNCA or California Northern Coastal Area Delegate who will then carry all that to the Conference in NY. Please join us and come be a part of.

The Three Legacies: Steps, Traditions and Concepts

Almost everyone in A.A. who has been around for few days is aware of the Steps. We may not understand them at first or know how to apply them but we know what they are. A dawning of awareness usually comes a bit later for the Traditions. We are told that they are for the Group what the Steps are for the individual. Sometimes we may even glimpse the spiritual qualities embodied in the Traditions but usually we ignore them until a conflict arises in the Fellowship. We are then reminded of their importance.

The Twelve Concepts, on the other hand, are rarely discussed at the individual or group level. Yet they are an important part of A.A. heritage and as such should be understood, especially by those who seek to be of service to the Fellowship at large.

As Bill W. explained, "These Twelve Concepts therefore represent an attempt to put on paper the why of our service structure in such a fashion that the highly valuable experience of the past and the conclusions that we have drawn from it cannot be lost...

"Hence, a prime purpose of these Twelve Concepts is to hold the experience and lessons of the early days constantly before us. This should reduce the chance of hasty and unnecessary change."

"Made a decision to turn our will and our lives over to the care of God as we understood Him"

So how does one practice Step Three when one's understanding of "God" is that he, she or it does not exist? Herein lies an often insurmountable problem for those who come to A.A. with an understanding of reality that does not rely on traditional religions or beliefs.... and even some who do, like most Buddhists, who firmly deny the existence of a "creator God".

In an effort to reach out to those who may be struggling with this, let me share my experience of overcoming this qualm during eleven years of sobriety in A.A.

The willingness to surrender and submit my ego and all of its harmful characteristics to a superior mode of being becomes obvious and compelling in the light of Step One. Even if the "God" mentioned in Step Three is conceived by me to be an idealized state of consciousness greater than the one I have so far experienced, well.... that works too! It is the principle of surrender that is important, the shedding of ego and the deflation of false pride. Becoming "right sized" as we say in A.A. Most religions today embrace this idea in some form or another. For instance, the word "Islam" means "to surrender or to submit".

OK, you may say, but how can I "turn my will and my life" over to the care of a principle if I don't believe in "God"? Well, just think... You do it every day already. If you participate at all in the financial system of the world (and

how can you not unless you live all by yourself in the middle of nowhere?) you have turned your life over to the principle of "money" which is a good example of something that ultimately exists in principle only. Every time you go to the grocery store you have turned your life over to "money"; to the fact that it will get you food and you will be able to live.

As long as I am willing to admit that my way doesn't work (as evidenced by the unmanageability demonstrated in Step One) I have in essence made a beginning, and that is all that is needed. There is a marvelous and almost miraculous quality of spiritual principles. My experience has been that even the slightest bit of effort, the smallest iota of willingness, or the most miniscule application of a suggestion by my sponsor or the Fellowship reaps huge spiritual rewards. "Fly efforts move elephants."

Let's try to remember that pride heads the list of the seven deadly sins and that, as the Twelve Steps & Twelve Traditions tells us, "the facts seem to be these: The more we become willing to depend upon a Higher Power, the more independent we actually are." (Pg.36)

By practicing Step Three we are in fact countering the poison of excessive pride and preparing the ground to be of service to others. We are preparing the way for a spiritual awakening.

TRADITION THREE by Morgan L.

"The only requirement for A.A. membership is a desire to stop drinking."

Chief among the alcoholic's shortcomings are relationships with others. The Twelve Traditions assist the fellowship of Alcoholics Anonymous in fostering right relations amongst each other and the world. To facilitate those right relations, Tradition Three states: The only requirement for A.A. membership is a desire to stop drinking. This inclusive philosophy ensures all individuals interested in joining AA are welcomed into the fold. This philosophy developed as alcoholics of varying backgrounds attempted to join the fellowship and founding members learned to open the fellowship to all.

In A.A.'s nascent years, requirements for membership were miles long and varied by group. Each meeting had its own set of "protective regulations" which admitted only select alcoholics. While the reasoning for A.A.'s selectiveness was twofold, the motive behind both reasons was the same; fear.

The first reason for early selectivity was because only a fraction of those joining remained sober. The palpable fear in the rooms was, "which one of was will be next to go out?"

The second more elusive reason A.A. was selective was to achieve a reputation as a respectable institution. Protective guidelines ensured only the most reputable white, Christian, male alcoholics became members. Such stringent requirements kept, "beggars, tramps, asylum inmates, prisoners, queers, plain crackpots, fallen women" and others who would tarnish A.A.'s reputation out of the fellowship.

The fears that spurned these stringent regulations were reviewed in A.A.'s second year of existence when a man of dubious character asked to join the fellowship. Ultimately, members set aside their fears and decided to walk in faith, allowing the man to join. Through his case and other early members it was decided that any individual with a desire to stop drinking could join Alcoholics Anonymous. When Tradition Three was published in the Grapevine, a set of questions accompanied the Tradition assisting individuals in determining how well they practiced Tradition Three. Questions included:

In my mind, do I prejudge some new A.A. members as losers?

Is there some kind of alcoholic whom I privately do not want in my A.A. group?

Do I set myself up as a judge of whether a newcomer is sincere or phony?

Do I let language, religion (or lack of it); race, education, age, or other such things interfere with my carrying the message?

Our answers remind us that *the only requirement for A.A. membership is a desire to stop drinking.* When we wholeheartedly adopt this inclusive philosophy we ensure that anyone in joining us is welcomed into the fold.

CONCEPT

The General Service Conference of A.A. has become, for nearly every practical purpose, the active voice and the effective conscience of our whole society on its world affairs.

When I came to this fellowship a few short years ago, I could barely comprehend the Steps, the Traditions made no sense at all, and the Concepts might as well have been written in Latin. Since then, I have gained understanding and experience with all three of A.A.'s legacies. The perception that the Traditions and Concepts did not apply to me as an individual member of the fellowship changed with the help of a service sponsor.

The Concepts, located in The A.A. Ser*vice Manual*, are written in language specifically discussing the General Service Conference, Trustees, A.A. World Service, and the Grapevine,. They contain the spirit of our service legacy. Concept Three is a perfect example to me of how these principles can be put into practice not only at A.A. World Service, but at local General Service, Intergroup (IFB), and local meetings.

I was struck by the Service Manual reference to Tradition Two when talking about Concept Three. It is important to remember that the final authority at all times is the collective group conscience of the fellowship. When a group grants the 'Right of Decision' to a trusted servant, the group retains the authority to correct mistakes made by the trusted servant. Hopefully the group has chosen wisely and never has to assert itself. Each commitment in A.A. has certain requirements and these decide what brand or how much to should be considered when electing

individuals to serve the group.

Let's look at the 'Right of Decision' from a service entity perspectiveeither local General Service or the IFB. When a group elects someone to represent them, they expect the individual to keep them informed of issues brought up at the monthly business meetings. They also expect their group's conscience to be carried to meetings and applied in topic discussions and voting when appropriate. There may be a vote at a business meeting that the group has discussed and given feedback to their representative to carry at the local level. If new information is presented at the business meeting, the trusted servant has the 'Right of Decision' to vote opposite the original group's conscience if the new information might have swayed the group's thinking. I have been at both IFB and General Service meetings when someone from the 'minority' opinion of a vote had something new to say that would affect our ability to live up to our primary purpose. When a revote was called, many of the servants exercised their 'Right of Decision' and changed their vote to help ensure the hand of A.A. is available for all who reach out.

Concept Three is at work at the group level, too. When a group elects a coffee maker, the members do not need to meet when they run out of coffee to (Continued on page 11)


AN INSPIRED SUCCESS-60 YEARS AND COUNTING by A Local Sot

F.A.I.T.H.—FINDING ANSWERS IN THE HEART

Having faith conjures up an old idea of believing something that may not really be true, rather like an action to make myself feel better by pretending. My old ideas about faith were formed and poisoned by an early blooming addiction to alcohol. It was my thirteen year-old attempt to resolve the emotional pain of rejection.

In recovery, I hear it said that "Faith without works is dead." If I simply believe something but don't take action, then I am in fear, not faith. Faith allows me to do the next right thing even though I can't see the outcome.

"Callista, you are like someone who is standing in a cold room talking to an empty fireplace saying, 'If you give me a little heat I'll give you a little wood." This was my sponsor in early sobriety when I was balking about following her suggestions. She said I suffered from "analysis paralysis."

Faith is demonstrated every time we drive somewhere at night. Of course, in the dark we can't see but a number of feet in front of the car at any one time but we know that if we stay on the road we can actually see well enough to make it safely to our destination.

I can't think my way into any solution. Taking action without using some knowledge, sense and wisdom can make for a lot of racket and splashing around, without getting anywhere or producing anything. God gave us brains to use. We can use them gratefully. My thinking is one of an alcoholic mind-set which instinctually operates on old ideas, fearful or negative expectations, and other less-than-sane guiding forces that are not often on the right footing. I get a better result when I gather new information - open

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up, get honest with someone else, ask for feedback and review my thought process, plans, and actual behavior.

When problem solving I discover what I intellectually know and when I review my options, I realize that there are still so many things that I can not know. My mind cannot go beyond it's ego by using intellectual thinking alone.

I have discovered faith and guidance beyond my intellectual limitations by sitting quietly and clearing my mind of all that I "know" and asking for direction. When I am open, and as clear as I can be of my own expectations, then answers come. Maybe not immediately ... but the inspiration for an answer does come because suddenly I am able to see answers in front of me in a new way. The "solution" can even dawn on me gradually over the course of a few days or weeks. Lending myself to the heart leads me to access greater wisdom from my Higher Power and I am using my brain as God intended. There is always some indication or confirmation of a direction that I should take or even the pure inspiration of a new thought. This comes when I pause and turn t P
